JUDGMENT

THE BAILIFF: Brannan, you came to Jersey with the express intention of defrauding people in this Island. The Court has made it perfectly clear that persons who come to Jersey as you did will go to prison, the question is for how long. It is a pity that you are so young and we have to sentence you to a term of imprisonment, but nevertheless your record does not help you. As the Crown Advocate said you embarked on a period of spending somebody else's money in this Island and defrauding traders and other people. In spite of the fact that your previous sentence of imprisonment was that of six months, we think that the conclusions are right. You are therefore sentenced to a total of eighteen months' imprisonment.
