TRADE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND NORTHERN IRELAND AND THE GOVERNMENT OF YUGOSLAVIA

London, 23rd December, 1948

The Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and the Government of the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia, desiring to ensure the conditions necessary to a steadily increasing exchange of goods between the United Kingdom and the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia, and intending to facilitate the development of their mutual trade have agreed as follows:—

ARTICLE I

The purpose of the present Agreement is to secure as nearly as possible a balanced trade at the end of the 12 months terminating on 30th September, 1949, due account being taken of other transactions which enter into the balance of payments.

ARTICLE II

The goods listed in Schedules I and II annexed to the present Agreement are likely so far as can at present be foreseen to constitute the greater part of the trade between the United Kingdom and the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia in the course of the year commencing 1st October, 1948.

ARTICLE III

(a) The Government of the United Kingdom undertake to issue upon application and in good time licences for the importation of the goods listed in Schedule I annexed to the present Agreement or where the goods are in practice purchased by the Government, to purchase them up to the values

or quantities specified in Schedule I.

(b) For their part the Government of the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia undertake to issue upon application and in good time licences where they are necessary for the export to the United Kingdom of the goods referred to in paragraph (a) of this Article up to the total values or quantities specified in Schedule I for the categories concerned. Where the Government of the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia are responsible for the allocation of the goods for export they will use their best endeavours to facilitate the supply of goods up to the values or quantities specified.

ARTICLE IV

(a) The Government of the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia undertake to issue upon application and in good time licences for the importation of the goods listed in Schedule II annexed to the present Agreement or where the goods are in practice purchased by the Government, to purchase them up to the values or quantities specified in Schedule II.

(b) For their part the Government of the United Kingdom undertake to issue upon application and in good time licences where they are necessary for the export to the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia of the goods referred to in paragraph (a) of this Article up to the total values or quantities specified in Schedule II for the categories concerned. Where the Government of the United Kingdom are responsible for the allocation of the goods for

export they will use their best endeavours to facilitate the supply of the goods up to the values or quantities specified.

ARTICLE V

Exceptionally where applications are made for export or import licences after 30th September, 1949, but before 31st March, 1950, in respect of goods listed in either Schedule I or Schedule II the contracting Governments will give favourable consideration to the issue of the export or import licence in question as the case may be up to the values or quantities specified in the relevant schedule. It is understood that this extension shall not be used to increase the total values or quantities specified in the schedules.

ARTICLE VI

The contracting Governments undertake to facilitate within the limits of their export and import policies the export or import as the case may be of goods not listed in the schedules or the import or export of goods up to a greater value or quantity than is specified in the schedules.

ARTICLE VII

Where reference is made in the present Agreement to the import, export or purchase of goods such import, export or purchase shall be subject to the negotiation of satisfactory contracts including agreement on the usual and generally recognised conditions governing the price, type, quality and other similar matters.

ARTICLE VIII

- (a) With a view to facilitating the transport of goods between the United Kingdom and the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia the contracting Governments shall give their full co-operation and support to the appropriate shipping undertakings of both countries in fostering development of the shipping trade between the two countries and the equitable and normal participation of the shipping of each country in that trade.
- (b) The contracting Governments agree in principle to facilitate the establishment by the shipping undertakings of either country in the territories of the other of agencies to carry out all the normal work of steamship agents and the introduction from time to time of such technicians as may be required to expedite ship repairs.
- (c) The contracting Governments shall also grant facilities for the shipping undertakings of their respective countries to engage immediately in direct negotiations in order to implement the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this Article.

ARTICLE IX

Desiring to take, in good time and in full concord, any steps necessary to ensure the satisfactory operation of the present Agreement, the contracting Governments undertake upon the request of either Government to consult with each other and, if necessary, to negotiate for the settlement of any difficulties which may have arisen. In any event the contracting Governments shall, in July, 1949, review the operation of the Agreement.

ARTICLE X

It is the desire of the contracting Governments that the trade between the United Kingdom and the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia shall develop over a wider field and they agree accordingly to enter at an early date into negotiations for the conclusion of a long-term trade agreement.

ARTICLE XI

The present Agreement shall come into force on the date of signature and shall remain in force until 30th September, 1949.

In witness whereof the undersigned, duly authorised for the purpose by their respective Governments, have signed the present Agreement and have affixed thereto their seals.
